This Sunday, Epiphany Sunday, closes out our Christmas season as the Wise Men arrive to see the Babe Jesus. As we celebrate their choice to resist Herod's demands by departing via a different way home, I invite you to reflect on one last **Carol of Resistance**. Though we are not singing it this Sunday, I believe its story is a meaningful devotion to conclude our Worship Series entitled; *I Believe, Even When...* 

In 1962, the carol, **Do You Hear What I Hear?** was written by Noel Regney and Gloria Shayne at the height of the Cuban Missile Crisis. Inspired by seeing babies pushed in strollers in New York City while the dire threat of nuclear war loomed, Noel

wrote, "said the night wind to the little lamb," and "pray for peace, people everywhere." The "star dancing in the night with a tail as big as a kite" can be interpreted as the star of Bethlehem but also what a nuclear missile looks like in flight. The composers said in an interview later that it was difficult to actually sing the song that year without crying. Indeed, our prayers for peace continue and the need to protect the children of the world and secure a future for them are as dire as ever.

As the last song in our series, may our prayers be, "a song high above the trees" with our voices as "big as the sea."




# Diaper Drive for Maker's Place

A ministry that was reflective and popular prior to our pastoral transition was Scripture as Art. Let's

see if it is still meaningful and expands our spiritual journeys.

It is a ministry open to ALL. If this is a new ministry to you, let me explain...

This is a ministry to participate in a low-structure exploration of scripture. It is a way to allow your creativity and imagination emerge as you reflect on a particular scripture. Need to be an artist? - NO! Just be open to the movement of the Spirit.

### This is how it works:

- 1. First think of "art" in broad terms...poetry, coloring, painting, sculpting, weaving, song, dance, and
- 2. Read the scripture I am naming over the next two weeks. As you read it, pay attention to what calls upon your imagination. Read or listen to the scripture with senses alert. What colors do you picture would be a part of a painting as your expression. What words or emotions stand out to you? What music style and lyrics might sing forth within you? On what aspect of the story does your heart focus?
- 3. Share your feelings and thoughts in some artistic representation. No talent and skill is judged. It is simple to draw deeper into God's word in a different way and allow God to speak to us through our senses. Allow it to become an act of prayer and/or praise.
- 4. Invite other friends and family to join you or do something themselves this is a great intergenerational activity.
- 5. On the date named, we will share our artistic expression with others online.

#### Scripture: Luke 5:17-25 (Common English Bible)

<sup>17</sup> One day when Jesus was teaching, Pharisees and legal experts were sitting nearby. They had come from every village in Galilee and Judea, and from Jerusalem. Now the power of the Lord was with Jesus to heal. <sup>18</sup> Some men were bringing a man who was paralyzed, lying on a cot. They wanted to carry him in and place him before Jesus, 19 but they couldn't reach him because of the crowd. So they took him up on the roof and lowered him—cot and all—through the roof tiles into the crowded room in front of Jesus. 20 When Jesus saw their faith, he said, "Friend, your sins are forgiven."

21 The legal experts and Pharisees began to mutter among themselves, "Who is this who insults God? Only

God can forgive sins!"

<sup>22</sup> Jesus recognized what they were discussing and responded, "Why do you fill your minds with these questions? 23 Which is easier—to say, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Get up and walk'? 24 But so that you will know that the Human One has authority on the earth to forgive sins"—Jesus now spoke to the man who was paralyzed, "I say to you, get up, take your cot, and go home." 25 Right away, the man stood before them, picked up his cot, and went home, praising God.


